Impact100 Fannin Drives Feed Fannin Into New Age

Impact100 of Fannin County, an organization of women who pool their money to help nonprofits in our county, awarded Feed Fannin a \$30,000 grant this past fall.

Feed Fannin applied for the grant to purchase a dedicated vehicle with which to transport fresh produce, and other food products from our farm and other local providers to the Food Pantry, Snack in a Backpack, the Good Samaritans' Community Thanksgiving Dinner, and other programs that feed the hungry in Fannin County.

For the past 10 years, the majority of Feed Fannin's food products and garden supplies have been transported in a volunteer's personal vehicle, a Jeep that is now 25 years old. This grant will ensure that Feed Fannin can continue to provide food to those in need of food assistance in our community.

Feed Fannin's Contributions to Snack in a Backpack Honored

On March 4, Snack in a Backpack honored Feed Fannin as a Community Champion during its annual Champions for Children celebration, a special evening celebrating the organizations and partnerships who work together to feed children in our community.

Noting that Feed Fannin plays "a vital role in the fight against hunger," Snack's Executive Director Debby Beck (left) commended the organization for its role as a key partner in Snack's Summer Meals program.

Feed Fannin Vice Chair for Farm, Facilities and Ag Education Kathy Beck told those assembled at the event that, during the eight weeks of the program each summer over the last three years, Feed Fannin has supplied more than 16,250 lbs. of produce to local families with children through Snack in a Backpack.

Pantry of New Habitat House Stocked by Feed Fannin

Feed Fannin took on a new initiative this spring, solidly stocking the pantry of a new house in McCaysville built by Habitat for Humanity for a young family in need.

The Kattkes have three children under 9. They had been living in a 2-bedroom townhouse, with the children sharing the bedrooms, and the parents sleeping in the living room. Habitat gave them the opportunity to buy their first home. They were very active in the building of the house, and on April 21, they finally got

to move in.



Thanks to Feed Fannin volunteers Carol and Carlos Martel for laying the groundwork for our organization to provide staple goods for the Kattke's pantry. Once it was agreed what

our role would be, Feed Fannin Vice Chair for Food Pantry and Community Outreach Priscilla Cashman, Treasurer Peggy Caldwell and Board Member Andy Livingston selected previously purchased food at the Family Connection Food Pantry and went shopping at Food Lion for other items (reportedly filling two "huge" carts full). They stocked the Kattke's pantry and fridge with 150 lbs. of goods, including a spiral-cut ham and fresh produce, and presented the family with a \$300 Food Lion gift card that they can use to purchase anything else they need.



"It was a really joyful experience," Priscilla said of the home's dedication ceremony. She noted that Habitat for Humanity of Fannin and Gilmer Counties Executive Director Anita Hardy "was blown away" by the stocked pantry and "incredibly grateful" to Feed Fannin, as were the Kattkes.

"It was a very nice and very emotional event for that nice young family," agreed Carol. "I don't think there were any dry eyes after the presentation."

The local Habitat group will turn next to building a house in Gilmer County but hopes to build again in Fannin County after that.

Holiday Meals Campaign Feeds Thousands

Feed Fannin's very successful Holiday Meals Campaign last fall raised funds that enabled us to greatly expand our community outreach efforts and supply the tables of local food-insecure families at Thanksgiving, Christmas and, for the first time, Easter.

An anonymous donor matched all donations made over a two-month period up to \$20,000, and Feed Fannin supporters generously chipped in another \$20,000 on top of that.

As a result, Feed Fannin purchased 1,500 spiral-cut hams, 101 one-pound canned hams and a variety of staple goods for Family Connection Food Pantry clients to enjoy during the winter holidays (retail value about \$9,100) and 600 additional spiral-cut hams for pantry clients at Easter.

We also contributed turkeys, turkey breasts and fresh sweet potatoes with a retail value of about \$1,500 to the Good Samaritans' Thanksgiving Open Table event; \$1,600 worth of spiralcut hams and turkeys to First Fruits of Fannin, which serves hot meals to those in

need; and 160 pounds of hams, turkey breasts, stuffing mix, green beans, corn, cranberry sauce, instant mashed potatoes, corn muffin mix and brownie mix to the North Georgia Mountain Crisis Network.

Congratulations to our 2025 Scholarship Winners!

Feed Fannin is pleased to have awarded four \$1,000 scholarships to very deserving students this year. Three recipients are Fannin County High School (FCHS) seniors, and one is from Copper Basin

High School (CBHS). All awardees have strong academic records, have shown leadership in their school activities, and have served as committed volunteers in their communities. Their further education and future career plans align with Feed Fannin's mission relating to food supply and providing support for people suffering with food insecurity.

When Feed Fannin started offering scholarships, the focus was to support students pursuing degrees related directly to agriculture. That was later expanded to include students planning to pursue degrees in education. Since then, the criteria have been expanded again to include environmental sciences, nutrition and food sciences, horticulture, agri-business, and veterinary medicine — areas tied closely to the production, use and management of agricultural products and the issues that impact their production and consumption.

This year's recipients from FCHS are:

- **Abigail McFarland**, who intends to pursue a degree in Veterinary Medicine (large animal) at North Georgia Tech and then Animal Science/Pre-Vet at Berry College;
- Aidyn Patterson, who plans to study Nursing with an emphasis in Nutrition at the University of North Georgia; and
- Leighla Isabella Patton, who intends to major in Education/Spanish at Berry College.

From CBHS, **Josie Emmaline Adams** was awarded a Feed Fannin Scholarship to help her pursue a degree in Elementary Education at Tennessee Wesleyan University.

Additional support to young people in our communities is provided through our 2025 grants (\$500 each) to support gardens in Fannin's public schools. To date, Blue Ridge Elementary, East Fannin Elementary and West Fannin Elementary have applied and been approved for this year's grants.

We also provided \$1,600 to send four students from Fannin County to 4-H Summer Camp this summer. Polk County will also be requesting funds soon for its 4-H Summer Camp.

Thank you to our Feed Fannin financial supporters who make these awards possible, and to this year's Education Committee members: Sue Blakeman,

As the Spring gardening season arrives and most planting is complete, I acknowledge a sense of relief and gratitude for all that helped to arrive at this point. Lately, I have thoughtfully reflected on all the volunteer hours and people who have come and gone over the past 15 years and how each contributed to the success of Feed Fannin.

The word that keeps coming to my mind is tapestry. Figuratively we use tapestry to mean "something that is made up of lots of different intertwined parts." Each volunteer has woven their thread or left their mark weaving relationships and collaborations to help build the Feed Fannin brand.

We are an all-volunteer organization, so we do not make a living from our work, nor is it even a profession, but more of a calling. We are on mission to create connections and link local needs and opportunities between people and common goals and projects that collectively make a positive impact. Our volunteers have worked hard to earn trust and support and give back to the community, and I am in awe each day of what we have been able to accomplish through the generosity of those we serve.



Holiday Meals Campaign continued

Twenty students in need at Fannin Mountain Education received spiral-cut hams and staple goods valued around \$900.

Feed Fannin delivered more than \$500 worth of hams, turkey breasts, sweet potatoes, cranberry sauce and brownie mix during the winter holidays to Eema's kitchen, which serves hot meals weekly at St. Anthony's Catholic Church and delivers meals to the Senior Center twice a month.

What's New at the Farm this Spring?

- Lease Extended Gratitude is expressed to the Fannin County School Board, which provides the property on which the Feed Fannin farm and home base are located. The School Board recently extended a lease giving Feed Fannin the option to lease the property on which our farm is located for up to six more years. We are so blessed!
- Roof Restoration Complete Huge thanks to the Steve Stacy Roofing family, staff and workers for their contribution to the Feed Fannin Roof Restoration on the farmhouse, carport and shed (see p.4). We are overwhelmed by their generosity!

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Steve Stacy Roofing Gifts Roof Restoration Project

Feed Fannin is humbled and gratified by the generosity of Steve Stacy Roofing. Farewell to Two Special People to Feed Fannin

Sue B. Campbell, 1938-2025

In the beginning, there was Sue....

From the first Feed Fannin meeting in February 2009 — there was Sue Campbell. Sue was one of the first and most knowledgeable

and dedicated members Feed Fannin ever had — and she was with us from the start.

Many remember Sue's gardening skills, her willingness to work and share, her humor and love of nature and Mother Earth.

Who can forget her Stone Soup Tales? Yes, we followed her recipe (stone and all) and partied with the delicious results.

In the beginning, we farmed the Davenport Lumber Yard side lot. Being it was once a road bed, we cultivated "stone and gravel." That year featured also one of Georgia's famous summer droughts. How well we recall the stories of the Feed Fannin irrigation team of Sue and Del Woods. There was a foot-wide stream down an embankment. Del would climb down the hill with Sue's milk jug, fill it and return it to Sue! Next time you are at the farm house notice the

painting (done by Joan Dickenson) of Sue rationing out the precious water to each seedling.

As a Master Gardener, Sue had many projects. She loved her heirloom



plants and teaching seed saving classes. She also loved "weeds" and could tell you all about them, what they were used for, and why to shun some and cherish others.

You could always find the "Hat Lady" at the Farmer's Market selling plants, answering questions and showing her buttons. All of this while bearing several health issues.

Sue Campbell's love of God's world, the environment, and Feed Fannin will always keep her close to our hearts. You are loved, Sue. •
